
To get a feel for true lightening of the forehand in collection ...

magine a long pipe half filled with water resting on your horse's back. In correct collection (when the horse rotates his pelvis under and down), he lowers his haunches, causing the water to flow to the rear of the pipe. This transfer of weight toward the haunches allows his forehand to lighten.—*Anne Crowell*
